August 1910 - New Le Roy Motor Car Company to open.

August 1910 - Peter Callan of Le Roy purchased a new bus from a firm in Paris, France to carry passengers to and from the railroad station to all parts of the village. On the top of the bus was a place for a large seat which would accommodate four people. The seats were upholstered with leather and very comfortable riding.

January 1916 - Le Roy has automobile herse. L. W. Steuben ordered an 8 cylinder Cunningham automobile funeral car. Cost - \$4,000. Speed of two miles per hour for slow driving.
